Tuesday 4 Oct. Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi: St. Francis founded the Franciscan order, including the Poor Clares and the lay Third Order. He was one of the most venerated figures in Christianity. In 1223, he arranged for the first Christmas live nativity scene. Pope Gregory IX canonized him on 16 July 1228. He and St. Catherine of Siena are the patron saints of Italy, and he is also the patron saint of ecology and of animals.

Wednesday 5 Oct.Feast Day of Sr. Faustina (Saint Maria Faustyna Kowalska) joined a convent in Warsaw, at the age of 20 years. She was later transferred to Plock and then to Vilnius, where she met Fr. Sopoćko, who was to be her confessor and spiritual director. He supported her devotion to the Divine Mercy. Sr. Faustina commissioned an artist to paint the first Divine Mercy image, based on her visions of Jesus. Fr. Sopoćko celebrated Mass in the presence of this painting on Low Sunday, also known as the Second Sunday of Easter or (as established by Pope John Paul)- Divine Mercy Sunday. Sr. Faustina was canonised on 30 April 2000.

Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time Day for Life

Faith can move mountains... well it can certainly get us moving. Recall a time when you were full of self-doubt, skepticism about a project, or lacking trust in God. What was that like? Contrast this with times when you believed in yourself, or in the value of a project you had undertaken, or when your faith and trust in God was strong. What kind of faith have you found enriched your life?

Faith is like a mustard seed, small-, and sometimes we may be tempted to wait till our faith grows. Part of the message in the gospel is to use the faith we have, even though it may be small. That is how we grow in belief in ourselves and in God's presence in our lives. Does your experience back up this?

It is nice when what we do is recognised and acknowledged, but the desire for recognition leaves us vulnerable. It is not always forthcoming. It can be helpful if our main motivation in doing something is the value of the action itself. Have you experienced this?

This is particularly true when it comes to love. Love is a free gift. What is given lovingly is not given because of a claim. What is your experience of the freedom of love given and received?
