PAPAL MESSAGE FOR THE DAY FOR LIFE 2023 - Pope Francis has kindly sent a message of encouragement for all who participate in the Day for Life. The message is as follows:

The Holy Father Francis was informed of the **celebration of the 2023 Day for Life in Ireland, Scotland, England and Wales under the theme "Listen to Her"** and sends his greetings and good wishes to all the participants. In listening to Mary, our Mother, and following her example, he invites us to discover our personal call from God who is the source of our existence, reminding us that, "Each human being is called by God to enjoy the fullness of life; and, is entrusted to the maternal care of the Church. FEAST DAYS WEEK COMMENCING 19 JUN '23

MON 19th JUN - ST ROMUALD OF RAVENNA (950-1027), had a somewhat prickly temperament and seems to have found it hard to settle in a community. Perhaps that is what pushed him to combine the life of a hermit with that of a monastic community. Romuald was born into a noble family and seems to have lived a rather dissolute life until he saw his own father kill a relative in a dispute over property. He then entered the Benedictine monastery of the Cluniac reform at Sant'Apollinare-in-Classa near Ravenna and after studying the Desert Fathers he proposed a more austere way of life for the monks. Although not all were in agreement with him he was elected abbot, and his correction of less zealous monks was not always welcomed. So he himself soon left the monastery. He put himself under the direction of a hermit near Venice. From there he moved on to set up hermitages in different places in northern Italy and southern France.

SAT 24th JUN - THE NATIVITY OF JOHN THE BAPTIST - This feast was observed on this date in the fourth century. It celebrates the birth of "the greatest of all the prophets," the one who leapt for joy in his mother's womb, who prepared the way for, announced his presence of, and baptised Jesus in the Jordan River – And how Ireland, commemorates it! As the feast of Christmas christianised the celebration of the winter solstice with the theme of the "unconquered sun", so it would seem does the feast of the birth of John the Baptist – six months earlier – christianise the summer solstice celebration from traditional religions. Celtic folklore associated the themes of fire and water with this feast. There are many indications in Irish folklore that this feast, Féile Naomh Eoin, was until recently the occasion for a wide range of ritual practices and merrymaking beginning on the previous evening – St John's Eve. This was Oíche an Tine Chnámh, "bonfire night", or Tine Féile Eoin, "St John's fire".

LENS OF THE GOSPEL

Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

*Jesus allowed himself to be touched by the needs of the crowd. When you are with people, what difference does it make to the way you relate to them when you have empathy with them? The commission Jesus gave the twelve 'to cure all kinds of diseases and sickness' is a reminder to us that we all have the capacity to be an influence for good in the lives of others. In this we continue the mission of Jesus (cf. St Teresa's Prayer). When have you experienced yourself as having a healing or life-giving influence on another person? Who has had that influence on you? At a first glance it might seem that Jesus made some bad choices in his twelve apostles. One will deny Jesus, another will betray him and others are only interested in who will be first. All of them will run away in the end. This reminds us that all kinds can share in the mission of Jesus, no matter how we see ourselves. The instructions Jesus gave the disciples before he sent them out have a note of urgency about them. What difference does it make for you when you approach a task with a sense of urgency? He also tells them their service should be 'without charge', keeping in mind what they have received without charge from God. Remember when you have received generous and undemanding love from another. **Intercom.***
